

Skunk, 3-D

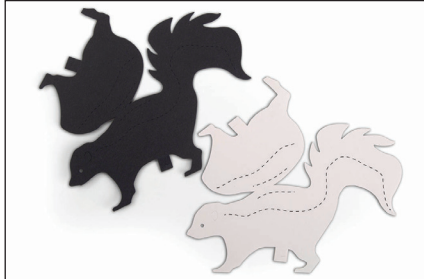

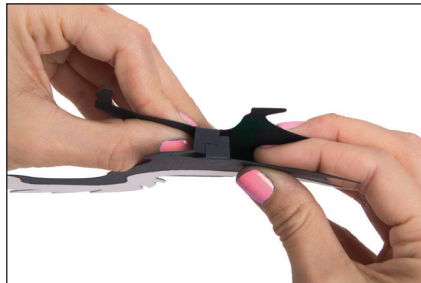

The teacher will die-cut the materials for student use prior to the lesson.

1. Die-cut the Skunk from black and white construction paper (Figure A).
2. Using the perforations as a guide, trim the white Skunk with scissors in order to layer it over the black Skunk (Figures B, C & D).
3. Cut an extra white layer to decorate the flip side of the Skunk (Figure D).
4. Fold along the middle of the Skunk (aligning the tabs), and then fold along the tabs (Figure E).
5. Interlock the slits in the tabs to allow the Skunk to stand up (Figures E & F).
6. Additional 3-D animal dies are available (Figure G).

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
