

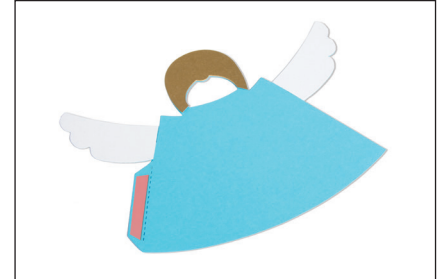
## Angel, 3-D



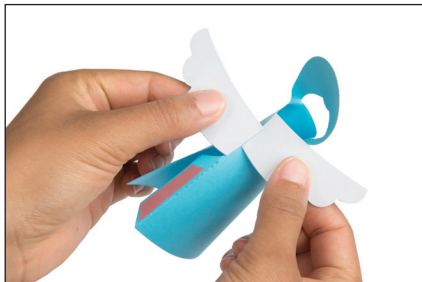

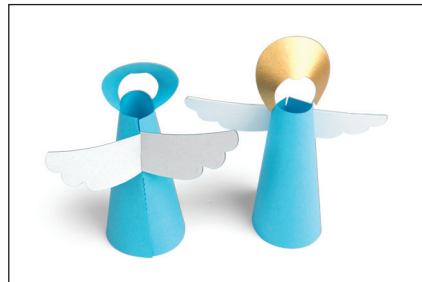

### The teacher will die-cut the materials for student use prior to the lesson.

1. Die-cut the Angel once out of colored paper for the base, twice out of a contrasting color for wings and once out of a third color for the halo (lightweight paper works best).
2. Trim two sets of wings, and attach the wings to the front and back of the Angel base.
3. Trim the halo, and attach the halo on top of the Angel base. (To create a tree ornament, place an embroidery thread loop between the two halo layers.) Place adhesive on the side tab.
4. Curl the Angel's body into a cylinder, and interlock the Angel wings at the two slits.
5. Adhere the tab to the opposite side to close the cylinder and complete the Angel.

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
